The Red Cross EU Office is a membership organisation in Brussels that represents National Red Cross Societies in the EU, the Icelandic Red Cross, the Norwegian Red Cross and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC).

Together, we monitor, analyse and influence EU laws, policies and programmes to better address the needs of people experiencing vulnerability inside and outside the EU. These key calls, based on <u>our strategy</u>, are addressed to EU decision-makers as we enter this new legislative term for the next five years.



The frequency, intensity, unpredictability and severity of extreme weather events is continually increasing, with negative impacts on people's health, livelihoods and wellbeing. Every day, Red Cross and Red Crescent staff and volunteers around the world witness how the climate crisis and environmental degradation challenge the resilience of communities. They work locally to help communities adapt and act quickly to prevent extreme weather events from becoming disasters.

Global humanitarian needs are constantly increasing, with hundreds of millions of people requiring humanitarian assistance and protection each year. Yet, the resources available to meet these needs fail to grow at the same pace, exacerbating the funding gap to unprecedented levels. Our staff and volunteers are present before, during and after disasters. They provide comprehensive support, especially for remote and hard-to-access communities.





The COVID-19 pandemic has left its marks on healthcare systems, weakening the quality and availability of services. In parallel, increasing socio-economic disparities are seriously challenging accessibility and coverage, jeopardising the health of individuals and communities worldwide. Our staff and volunteers support public health authorities by reinforcing healthcare systems and safeguarding universal access to essential services, including in emergencies.

Over the past years, restrictive measures have negatively impacted the lives of migrants and the work of humanitarian actors supporting them. The individual needs of migrants are growing in all phases of the migration process – along increasingly dangerous journeys, but also upon arrival and during their integration in society. Our staff and volunteers work to save lives, address needs and contribute to building inclusive societies where everyone can thrive.





In Europe and beyond, successive crises have deepened social divisions and aggravated precarity and vulnerabilities. Poverty and violence are increasingly impacting individuals, their families, communities and society. Additionally, limited recognition and financing of social service providers is hindering their operational capacity and the continuity of community-based services. Regardless, our staff and volunteers deliver a wide range of care and assistance every day, but they need more support to be able to address increasing needs.
